Opening Prayer

You are the Alpha and the Omega - the beginning and the end of all things, who always is the same and never changes, and whose years fail not. We now, at the close of another year, kneel in adoration before you, and offer you our deepest gratitude for the brotherly care with which you have watched over us during the past, for the many times you have shielded us from evils of soul and body, even in times of

- 3. Let us think of the growth in faith and increased awareness of the presence of God in our lives, or even the times when we lacked faith and felt disappointed with the turn of events that went against us ... (PAUSE 5 secs)
- 4. Let us think of new skills or talents we may have developed during this year. How have these affected our life ... (PAUSE 5 secs)

Let us use this opportunity to praise and thank God for the wonderful blessings of the year 2020.

Scripture Reading: Luke 2:22-35

Narration:

During this Christmas Octave the scriptures speak of the Presentation of our Lord in the Temple. When the days of purification of Mary were accomplished, as per the law of Moses, the child Jesus was brought to the Temple along with the stipulated offerings. That day, Simeon, a righteous and devout man, filled with the Holy Spirit and carrying the child Jesus in his arms praised God declaring Jesus as the long awaited Messiah sent by God for all – the Jews as well as the Gentiles. He also foretells the challenges that Mary will have to face on her giving her consent to be the Mother of God.

Reflection:

Mary did not need to be purified but she followed all the laws of the faith during her time. This sense of humility is an example for all of us to follow. Jesus is not the Messiah for just the Jews deemed as the chosen ones in those days. He is the Saviour of all the people in the world for those who believe in Him. We are truly a "universal" Catholic Church.

Being selected to be the Mother of God was a glorious event but it came with its set of challenges. Mary faced all of them resolutely. In this lies a message for all of us. Being a follower of Christ can pose us many unexpected challenges both from within and without. How do we handle them? When we are afraid we can recall Jesus' own words – "Do not fear".

We also anticipate the 1st of January, the beginning of the New Year, dedicated to Mary, the Mother of God, that, thanking her for her intercession during the past year, we may continue to truly turn to her to lead the way for us into the coming months, instilling in us the love and courage that already flows from God through her divine intercession.

One of the best gifts we have received from God is the gift of time. As we look forward to a new year, we offer this time spread through the year to God in the spirit of unity and love which St Peter speaks about in the following reading.

Scripture Reading: 1 Peter 3: 8-13

Reflection:

St. Peter speaks of the importance of being united – in mind and body, of having sympathy, love, a tender heart and a humble mind when living in our communities. We are not to be revengeful. This is the way of the world which leads to strife, dissent, hatred and disunity. No one benefits from such a strategy. But having a spirit of unity brings blessings. We are not to slander. Rather we should turn away from evil and do good. Can anyone suffer for doing good? In fact, even if one does, we would be blessed for it. For Christ willingly suffered not because he had sinned but for the sins of the whole world.
